

Managed to enhance the wildlife value of the land our Cemetery provides a peaceful haven in this busy world. In spring snowdrops are followed by a succession of crocus, narcissi, primroses, celandine through to the summer of ox eye daisies and other native species.

All the original headstones and memorials are still in place and carry clear and poignant messages from those left behind, as well as hinting at some fascinating history. The cemetery opened in 1860 and the details of each grave and its occupant are recorded, as are the minutes of the Trustees.



Unlike many Church and Local Authority managed burial grounds, St. Cleer General Cemetery has no rules banning artificial flowers. The choice of memorial is left to Those commissioning that work, and it is possible to have a proper monument erected at the site of interred ashes.

We can accommodate those who wish a green burial in a non-traditional coffin, as many now want one made of more sustainable materials like willow.

There are benches placed within the grounds where friends and family visiting graves can sit in quiet contemplation if they wish.

The aim is a gentle and welcoming feel at one with nature and at peace.
